

## PROGRAMME OUTCOMES (POs)

B.A. Sanskrit 1+1+1 Honours  
Department Of Sanskrit

POs are statements about what the students should know, be able to do, and think by the end of the plan (a three-year B.A. Honours course). POs look at the big picture of a program's graduation and the skills and information that a honours graduate will have after the course is over.

Students of Sanskrit at the undergraduate level had the opportunity to learn about India's ancient heritage, which has developed over the last four thousand years and has had an ineffable impact on Indian life and culture. The programme aimed to inspire and improve everyone's life.

1. This class will use different Sanskrit texts to teach students about the theory, religion, history, and culture of classical Sanskrit literature.
2. Students will learn more advanced Sanskrit. So, they will be able to read, write, and understand books in Sanskrit well on their own.
3. They will be able to understand Sanskrit texts by using ideas from old Indian religion, literature, history, and even technical and science writing. important theoretical points of view on
4. This class teaches students how to write in an academic style, give oral presentations, and present academic study on ancient Indian literature, history, religion, and culture by using Sanskrit and Oriental texts.
5. Students would have the general skills and professional knowledge they need to understand the old system of medicine (Ayurveda), health studies like yogā, and the traditional time system (Jyotiṣ). Dramaturgy and acting, personality development and behavioural science, computer and Sanskrit, building science (Vāstu Vidyā), Vedic mathematics, epigraphy (Purālīpi śāstra). Metre and music, as well as the study of the environment and other things, can help people and society as a whole learn how to solve issues.
6. The students would be able to figure out how to understand the śāstras and show how they can be used to solve present intellectual and practical problems.
7. Students would be able to make even study projects, tasks, etc., look for sources, and have analytical conversations.
8. Students will understand and be able to describe why Sanskrit is important in the context of Indian nations and nationalism as a way to bring people together.
9. When people study Sanskrit books, they become better people right away. They would have higher moral, social, and spiritual standards, which would help them grow as people. Students were able to demonstrate increased knowledge and comprehension of all areas of Sanskrit literature and language.
10. By 1400 B.C., students would have knowledge of the Indus Valley civilization. Numerous aspects of the Vedic period must be understood, including their age, literature, social, political, economic, and religious beliefs.

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
